

Tunisian Beaworthy Cowl



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Explore simple Tunisian Lattice stitches to create a beautiful, functional cowl. I wanted to design something that was relatively straight forward, so that I could enjoy the rhythm of the stitches without constantly referring to the pattern. I used one ball of King Cole Riot DK.

Tunisian Beaworthy Cowl - Materials

Yarn: 1 x 100g/294m King Cole Riot DK (30% wool 70% acrylic)

Hook: 6.5mm Tunisian crochet hook with extension cord, and a 4mm standard crochet hook for the edging.

Tunisian Beaworthy Cowl - Dimensions

Finished size after blocking: 22 inches by 10.75 inches

Gauge: unblocked over Tunisian Lattice Stitch on 6.5mm hook - 22 stitches and 15 rows to 4 inches

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Tunisian Beaworthy Cowl - Abbreviations

Ch - chain

st(s) - stitch(es)

Tss - Tunisian simple stitch

Tss2tog - insert hook under next 2 vertical bars, yo, pull up a loop (1 loop on hook)

Lattice stitch - Tss2tog, Tss back into 1st stitch of Tss2tog. This stitch is staggered over two rows by placing a Tss1 at the start or end of alternate rows.

Bind off - work a slip stitch row after completing last return pass. Insert hook into next stitch TSS wise, yo and pull yarn through both loops on hook. Repeat for each stitch until one loop remains. Cut yarn and draw through loop to fasten off.

Tunisian Beaworthy Cowl - Pattern Notes

- Pattern rows are Forward Pass instructions only. Follow each row with a Return Pass.
- Return Pass instructions: Ch1, *yo, pull through next 2 loops on hook; repeat from * until 1 loop remains on hook.

Tunisian Beaworthy Cowl - Pattern

Row 1 - (Foundation row): Using 6.5mm Tunisian hook, make a slip knot and leave a 4" tail. Ch 101. Roll the chain slightly towards you, and starting in the 2nd ch from hook, insert the hook into the back bump that lies behind the chain. Yarn over and pull through a loop, leaving loop on hook. Continue picking up loops to the end of the chain row. 101 loops on hook.

Row 2: Begin Lattice stitch. *Tss2tog, Tss back into 1st stitch of Tss2tog. Repeat from * across the row until two stitches remain. Tss 1, work end stitch.

Row 3: Set Lattice stitch by starting Tss 1, *Tss2tog, Tss back into 1st stitch of Tss2tog. Repeat from * across the row. Work end stitch.

Rows 2 and 3 form pattern. Repeat until cowl reaches desired depth. I worked 9 inches.



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This completes the body of the cowl. Bind off until there is a final loop on hook. **Do not** cut yarn.

Edging

Change to 4mm standard crochet hook

Abbreviations (English):

Ch - chain

Slst - slip stitch

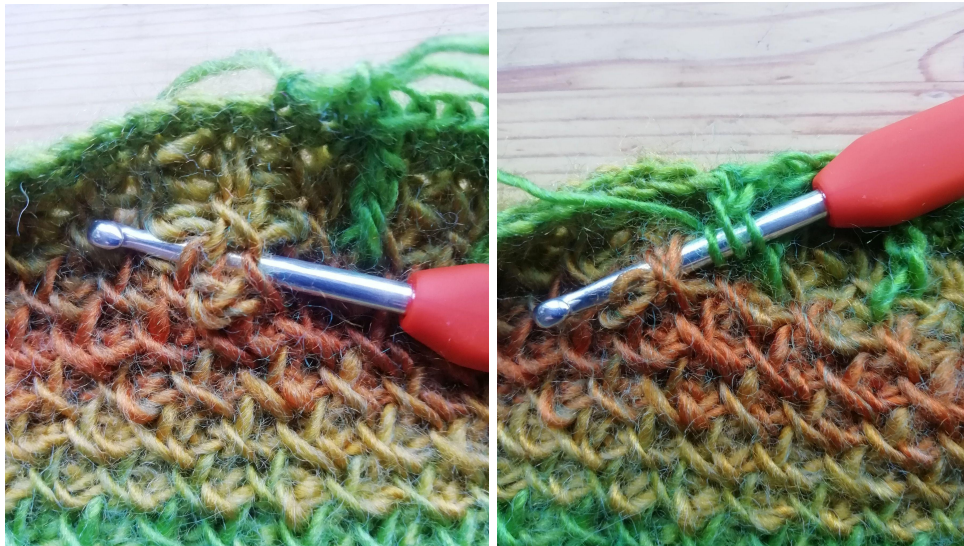
Dc - double crochet

FPDtr - front post double treble crochet

Top edge:

Row 1 (Wrong side facing): Ch1 to turn (does not count as a stitch). Dc across the row. (101dc).

Row 2 (Right side facing): Ch1 to turn (does not count as a stitch). Dc into each of the first two stitches. *FPDtr around group of stitches two rows below, directly under next dc. Skip stitch. Work dc into each of the next two stitches. Repeat from * across the row to the end.



Row 3: Ch1 to turn (does not count as a stitch), dc across the row. (101dc).

Row 4: Ch1 to turn (does not count as a stitch). * Work (dc, 3ch, dc) into next stitch. Skip the next stitch. Repeat from * across the row until one stitch remains. Dc into end stitch. Fasten off.

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Bottom edge:

With right side facing, rejoin yarn to bottom edge and work two rows of dc. Cut yarn, leaving a long tail that you will use to sew up the side seam, and pull through last loop to finish.

Block, and when dry sew the short edges together using mattress stitch. Lay the edges together, wrong side up and with edges touching. You may find it helpful to put a piece of card between the layers of the cowl, so you don't inadvertently put the needle through all layers. Using a yarn needle, weave back and forth around the centres of the stitches, without pulling too tight. Weave in remaining loose ends,



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
